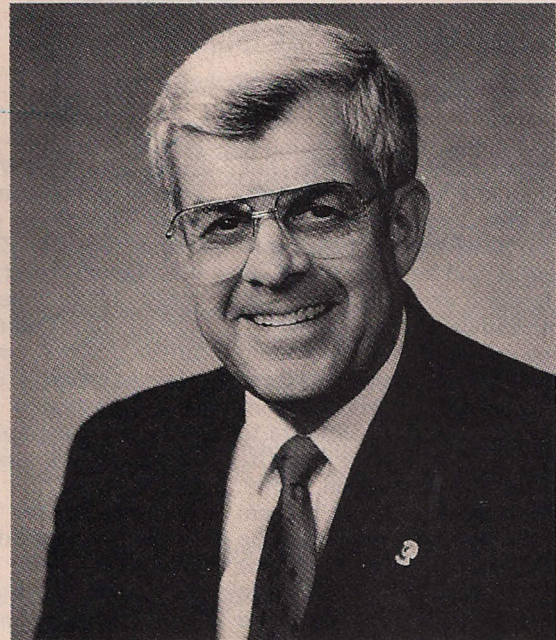


Officers and Directors Lions Clubs International 1993-1994



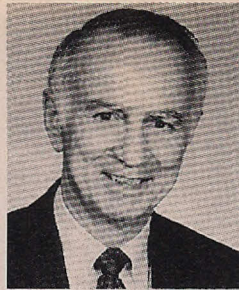
