Dr. Tae-Sup Lee International President

Dr. Tae-Sup "TS" Lee, of Seoul, Republic of Korea, was elected to serve as President of The International Association of Lions Clubs at the association's 86th International Convention in Denver, Colorado, June 30-July 4, 2003.

A Lion since 1975 and member of the Seoul Sejong Lions Club with 25 years of perfect attendance, President Lee has held many positions within the association, including club president, zone chairman, region chairman, district governor and council chairman. He served as an international director on the association's board of directors from 1993 to 1995. He also was chairman of the 32nd OSEAL Forum and co-chairman of the Host Committee for the 78th International Convention.

President Lee has received numerous awards in recognition of his service to the association, including several International President's Certificates of Appreciation and the Ambassador of Good Will Award. He is also a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

Haing-Ja, President's Lee wife, is well-known in her own right for her non-governmental public service in Korea. After four years as the president of the Seoul YWCA, she has recently been elected to a three-year term as the president of the Korea YWCA. President Lee and Haing-Ja, who is also a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, have two sons and three grandchildren. Following his success in the business world, Dr. Lee turned to politics and was elected to four terms of the National Assembly of Korea. He also served his nation twice as a Cabinet Minister, with portfolios in Political Affairs and Science and Technology. President Lee played an instrumental role in the miraculous recovery of the Korean economy following the 1997 Asian Financial Crisis as a member of the 12-person Emergency Economic Committee that led the country's successful response. More recently, Dr. Lee has been working as the chairman and CEO of the Korea Nuclear Energy Foundation.

Guided by his presidential theme, Innovation: Gateway to Our Future, President Lee promises to synthesize his experiences in research, business and government to lead the global Lions in developing more innovative service solutions during the upcoming year.

He was a 100% District Governor and is the chairman emeritus of the Lions Hospital and Medical Centre of Bombay. Vice President Mehta has received 19 Extension Awards, 20 International President's Awards and the Ambassador of Good Will Award. He is also a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

Second Vice President Mehta has been active in numerous community activities, among them serving as special executive magistrate to the government of Maharashtra, secretary for the Mahavir Heart Research Foundation, chairman of the M.P. Habitat for Humanity Colorado

Members of the Redlands Lions Club in Grand Junction, Colorado, have joined hundreds of their fellow Lions to work with Habitat for Humanity, bringing affordable housing to families with disabilities.

The Luby family was chosen to receive the house. Chris Luby is wheelchair-bound with cerebral palsy. His wife, Mundy, is legally blind, and the couple have a fouryear-old daughter, Erin.

Redlands Lion Steve Sheehy, the fundraising coordinator for the project, contacted other clubs in the area for help. The Clifton, Fruitvale, Grand Junction and Palisade Lions clubs provided funds or inkind donations. For example, Past District Governor and Fruitvale Lion Richard Hoey donated \$2,500 in concrete work for the home's construction. In all, Lions contributed \$12,500, Habitat an additional \$12,500, which qualified the project to receive an LCIF Core-4 Grant for \$25,000.

Once the funding was in place, work could begin. Volunteers broke ground on August 6, 2002, and the home was officially dedicated on December 28. The ceremony was attended by local Lions and Habitat volunteers, and Past International Director Dr. Larry "Doc" Hahn was also present. The event was well covered by the media, including several local television stations and newspapers.

The home is fully equipped to accommodate Chris Luby's wheelchair and has special lighting to enhance Mundy's vision.
