### PAST PRES. DIES

William A. Westfall, the tenth President of Lions International (in 1926-27), has died. He was 87.

Lion Westfall passed away in a Mason City, Iowa nursing home after a long illness.

During his administration as International President, Lionism was extended to Mexico and China. Later, he served for many years as Chairman of the Constitution and



in Japan, Korea, Taiwan, the Philippines, Hong Kong, Thailand, Malaya, Singapore, Australia and New Zealand. Their travels this month are to take them to the Fiji Islands and Hawaii, before returning home to Miami Beach, Florida.

# LION STORY IN PAGEANT

Lion Westfall was charter president of the Mason City club, organized in 1921. In 1925, he was elected Third Int. Vice-President; in 1924, Second Vice-President, and in 1925, First Vice-President. His Second Vice-Presidency came during the administration of then Int. Pres. Harry A. Newman of Toronto, Ontario. Past Pres. Newman represented Lions International at the funeral services in Mason City.

Lion Westfall was a prominent attorney in Iowa and practiced law there for much of his professional career. He was graduated from the University of Michigan in 1900. He was a member of the Masonic order, and was a Grand Master of the Masonic Lodge of Iowa in 1919-20.

He was known by his nickname, "Westy," to his friends. Oldtime acquaintances recall him as a quiet, affable man whom one instinctively liked.

Lion Westfall is survived by his widow, Hattie; a daughter, Dorothy (Mrs. Draper Long), and a granddaughter, Mary Long.
